


Weekend Movie - EDUCATING RITA

The birdbox will be auctioned again Friday December 18th.






























TWENTY TWENTYS NEARLY DONE Let's get ready for Twenty Twenty-One






LIBRARY HIGHLIGHTS FOR NOVEMBER/DECEMBER 2020

A further 25 books have been added to the Library this last month. Among them is one donated by John Wakelin who





'The mystery of how a modest farm valuer from New Zealand could be so ferocious and fearless in battle has fascinated author Tom Scott ever since, as a schoolboy, he read about Charles Upham – the only combat soldier to win the Victoria Cross twice. His numerous acts of bravery in the Second World War meant he probably deserved six more. When Charlie died (22 Nov '94), the famed Afrika Korps (led by Rommel), took the extraordinary step of placing a death notice in the Christchurch *Press* newspaper saluting him 'as one of the bravest and one of the best soldiers'. His moral courage lent wings to his physical courage.

Working in New Zealand's rugged high country gave him strength and stamina, made him a crack shot and gave him a feel for terrain that served him well in battle, helping him become a living legend within the New Zealand Division – an epithet that he detested.' John describes the book as 'meticulously and superbly crafted, a must-read story of one of New Zealand's greatest heroes. Thank you John.

There are eight 'new for our library' titles in Large Print. At least two of them are murder stories. One that caught my eye is *The Grocer's Granddaughter* by Rose Parish. Published in 2007 this is a very special picture of life in the Worcestershire village of Ombersley during the 1940s. It is a pithy account of village life as it was, offering a view decidedly unlike a picture-postcard image. The author also recalls her Grandmother's stories, adding another dimension to the book. For those of you who have seen the film *A Street Cat named Bob*by by James Bowen you may enjoy reading in LP the book about this extraordinary cat.

To Note:

- **The Gathering** by **Anne Enright.** Another 2007 publication but this one won the Booker Prize in 2007. Described as a daring, witty, and insightful Irish family epic. Clarified through Anne Enright's unblinking eye, it is a novel about love and disappointment, about how memories warp and secrets fester, and how fate is written in the body, not in the stars. Wonderful writing.
- The Parrot's Theorem: A Novel by Denis Guedj. Initially published in French in 1998 it became available in translated form in 2000. It charmingly combines a straightforward history of mathematics and a first-rate murder mystery so don't be scared off by the title.
- Lenny's Book of Everything by Karen Foxlee. This has been nominated as The Book Of the Year by Older Readers in Queensland in 2019 and nominated for the Carnegie Medal 2020. It is a book about finding good in the bad that will break your heart while raising your spirits in the way that only a classic novel can.
- Nights in the Garden of Spain by Witi Ihimaera, a well-respected New Zealand writer. This
 novel explores the divide between sexuality and social mores, and the dilemmas of gay culture. It
 is all done with laughter and anger, honesty, and sensitivity. Incidentally, it has nothing to do with
 Spain! Beautifully written.

With Christmas coming combined with summer holidays there will be perhaps more time to read and enjoy new books which hopefully can be shared more widely with residents next year.
