Garden Corner

Hello All,

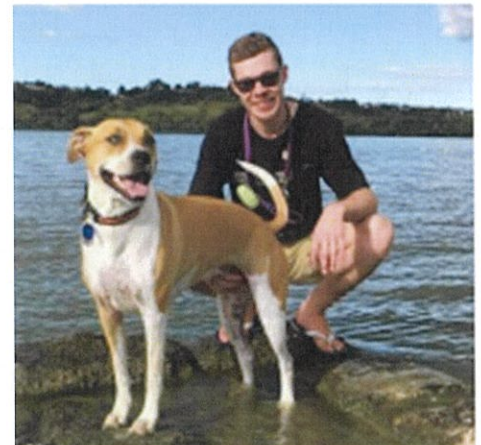
Just a quick update from myself and the Boys. We are moving through all our major jobs before summer makes an appearance and the heat starts cranking.

Just a quick one regarding our Rubbish Collection on Mondays. Please remember to have your Rubbish/Recycling/Green Waste out on the street before 7:30am. Anything on the side of the road will be picked up. We collect in two teams, one on recycling and the other team on rubbish, in our blue truck. Please make sure rubbish is in ONE bin bag please - not multiple small ones.

A big thanks to Paul Fleming for taking time out of his mornings to be our truck driver on Mondays and Fridays. It's been unbelievably helpful, and his bubbly personality really brightens our glum Monday Mornings.

Currently we are going through our house-to-house cycle down Lavender, undertaking all work discussed during our one-on-one meetings as well as our odd jobs in between. We're giving things a nice spring tidy and shaping as well as getting that nice layer of mulch down.

Monday, we welcomed Connor to the team. Connor is an outdoorsy guy who loves fishing, boating and camping. He enjoys spending time with family and friends and his rescue dog. If you see him around don't be afraid to say hi.



I'm continuing to jump around and get those last-minute prunes in for our Roses, Hibiscus and Tibuchinas. Cutting things back now and opening the plant up gives it a nice strong foundation to bloom into the next year. Remember, if you are out pruning, look after your tools afterwards. After use, make sure you are keeping them clean and healthy. Soak in vinegar and water and scrub with steel wool to remove any rust, rinse and dry. Soak in bleach and water to sanitize, rinse and dry. CRC is a great one to use to oil those hinges and sanitize your equipment. Keeping the blade nice and sharp won't only help with cutting easily but will also prevent damage. Unclean cuts on a plant leave it wide open and susceptible to pests and diseases.

The 100-year-old giant glasshouses hold hundreds of lovely managed plants in each house. One house is kept at a tropical temperature and planted with lots of tropical plants. The other house has lots of NZ natives. The 2 glasshouses are placed at each end of the planted pond. Just quietly stroll through each house as our bus will allow one hour for your stroll.

Then we reboard the bus and go back over the bridge to Onepoto Garden at Northcote. This spacious park is set in a volcanic cone with a pond, easy walks and a green area for picnics.

A note from Gareth

Below is a copy of my latest email to Auckland Transport, their boss and the Auckland mayor regarding the much-needed bus stop for east-bound buses on Oteha Valley Road at Medallion Drive. Don't hold your breath but I am still trying on this matter.
