From the Manager's desk

My maternity leave

A letter was distributed to all residents earlier this week regarding my maternity leave coming up. As detailed in the letter, I am planning to go on maternity leave towards the end of December as baby boy is due on 27th December. I am delighted that Gary, Settlers' Manager, will be looking after Fairview in my absence, as well as being supported by our CEO Terry and CFO Brett. I know residents and our team will be in good hands, which will make my return next year a smooth transition. We will hold a gathering with residents to officially welcome Gary in December, details are to be confirmed. In the meantime, I want to thank you all for your best wishes, your daily checks-in and all the baby names' suggestions.

Painting of villa roofs

Our PLVL Board has approved and finalised the roofs' repairs and repainting for all villas at Fairview. The first stage of this project will commence next week from Monday 21st October. This project will be managed by our current contractor Platinum Painters, with a team of two experienced contractors who are already familiar with Fairview. This project can only be completed in dry weather conditions, so it is estimated to take up to 2 years to complete. The same current roofs' colours will be used, and roofs will be matching the gutters.

Stage 1 will be for the villas on the streets below and will be proceeding in numerical order:

- Ash Avenue (3-5),
- Beech Way (6-14),
- Cherry Hill (16-24),
- Magnolia Terrace (120-125/128/130-133),
- Ngaio Lane (136-138/143-145),
- Poppy Vale (135/142/147)
- Olive Grove (146 only)

From Monday 21st October, Platinum Painters will start with cleaning the roofs of the Stage 1 villas above. This work will take approximately ten working days to complete. Roofs will need to be given a rest of 3 weeks for the chemicals to act, then repairs and painting will be able to start. During the painting process, scaffolding edge protection will be erected outside each villa, one villa at a time. The Stage 1 scaffolding is expected to start from Monday 18th November. We will liaise with residents in advance so you can expect when the scaffolding will be set up at your villa. Scaffolding, repairs, and painting should then take approximately 5 days to complete per villa. We will always do our best to inform residents ahead of time when the painters will be visiting their villa next, weather dependent.

Platinum Painters will be finishing early December for this year and resuming mid to late January 2025, carrying on with the rest of the Village throughout the year. There will be no scaffolding over the Christmas period. Stage 2 and villas numbers are yet to be confirmed for next year.

FINANCIAL POSITION

The balance in the account as at 7th October is \$10,569.63. The committee agreed to allocate \$1500 to the library.

GENERAL

- Upcoming events arranged by the social committee were discussed. These included the Melbourne Cup sweepstake and the Christmas dinner on the 11th December. The residents' committee will be helping as needed.
- The urgent need for a clear pedestrian crossing sign on Margaret Drive was discussed with Marika. She said she would follow this up. Too many cars are not going at the required 15 kph.
- Ramps are needed on the crossing by Ash Ave to assist people using mobility scooters and walking frames. The matter has been raised before and is a safety issue requiring Jono's attention.
- The question of turning gas off quickly was discussed. Marika said she had contacted Vector and there were a number of problems that needed to be ironed out.
- The popular "2 for 1" nights organized by Noris and his team were praised and the question asked as to why they were not being held on bar nights. We were told that Tuesday night has been chosen because Tuesdays are normally quiet days.
- The problem of some residents having difficulty accessing cash was discussed. Marika said she would investigate possible solutions.

NEW BOOKS

The Chilling by Riley James - Keen to flee the wreckage of her marriage, Australian scientist Kit accepts a coveted winter research position at Macpherson Station in Antarctica. On the way there, Kit and her fellow researchers field a distress call from a nearby ship, but when they reach the ship, it is on fire, and the crew has vanished.

The Days I loved you Most by Amy Neff - Joseph and Evelyn's New England beach homes have been side by side for generations, and in 1941 they fell in love. Now, more than sixty years later, they gather their three grown children to share the staggering news that in year's time, with Evelyn's diagnosis a reality, they will end their lives on their own terms.

The Bookshop Detectives: Dead Girl Gone by Gareth and Louise Ward - When a mystery parcel arrives at Sherlock Tomes Bookshop in small-town Havelock North, New Zealand, husband and wife owners Garth and Eloise are drawn into a baffling case of a decades-old case of a missing schoolgirl. The Venice Hotel by Tess Woods - When the lives of four very different women become entangled in a boutique Venice hotel, dark secrets unravel and not everyone who checked into the hotel will check out again. Set against a backdrop of the romance and tragedy of magical Venice, *The Venice Hotel* explores the powerful bonds that develop between women in times of crisis, and the healing power of female connection.

Tiananmen Square by Lai Wen - A deeply moving moving novel about growing up in Beijing in the 1970s & 80s and taking part in the Tiananmen Square protests. A truly remarkable novel about coming to see the world as it is - of one girl's life growing up in the China of the 1970s and 80s and as a student who takes part in the events of 1989 - this is about hope and idealism and the price many of the students paid.


