## From the Manager's desk

#### Happy Easter

#### Easter and Anzac period

**Reception** - will be closed tomorrow on Good Friday 18<sup>th</sup> of April. It will also be closed the on Easter Monday 21<sup>st</sup> of April and on Anzac Day Friday 25<sup>th</sup> of April. #### Health and Wellbeing Corner

Hello All,

#### Bugs

There is a nasty cold that gets on to your chest very quickly and then there is the nasty vomiting, and you know what bug. Let us know if you are at all concerned. We will be able to assess you. And please do tell us if you are feeling sick before we see you so we can wear appropriate protection. In these cases, don't drop in, please use your phone.

#### **Fire Evacuation Notice**

This week we will check that you have one of these behind your door and a green evacuated door hanger.

You do not need the fire evac form, but we will provide one if you would like one.

It is really used as a prompt to remind you what to do in the case of an evacuation.

#### **Needs Assessments**

This is something that has come up lately and probably needs to be looked at by some of our residents.

Needs Assessments are undertaken to get support and services to support you to be as independent as possible.

## However, they are also required to determine the level of care you would need if you had to be transferred into a rest home, hospital 24 hour care or dementia care.

If you are the main carer of a spouse/partner and they could not be independent without your care then you should have an up-to-date Needs Assessment stating what kind of care they would need if you were no longer able to care for them due to such things as illness, surgery, respite etc. This can be done through contacting the Needs Assessment Coordination Service – just call North Shore hospital, or it can be done through your GP.

By having this available, it is much easier to get emergency care and or long-term care. If you don't have one of these your care options are limited for as long as it takes to get one, meaning that other members of the family or 24-hour carers, usually at your cost, must take up the position of main carer for days and in some cases weeks.

This doesn't mean if it showed that your partner needed Rest Home Care that they have to transfer into a rest home, as long as you are happy caring for them and can continue to take on the challenge of that then they can of course stay with you, however if the time comes that you need this service it is in place.

Understand too that these have expiry dates, people's needs and levels of care change so they do need to be updated for the best and right care to be provided when needed.

#### **Nurses' Hours**

We now have a diary so we will be giving you appointment times. This helps us plan our day and assist you better.

We also have a sign on the nurse's door, not the doctors room door. It advises whether we are in or out. If we are in, please knock and wait. If we are out, and you feel it is urgent, please ring the nurse's number or if you don't have a phone ask Cherie to put through a call and we will let you know our expected time back.

#### Hairdresser

I have been asked by the Hairdresser to advise you to please stay away if you have a cold. It is often the way that we think if I get my hair done, I'll feel better – however the poor old hairdresser ends up being sick.

Please ring – don't feel that you need to go if you are sick – thank you.

#### MORE DID YOU KNOW FROM PAUL

Paul would like us to understand why a stoat is a challenge for our mainly ground dwelling birds such as the Kiwi and kakapo skinks etc. The stoat is a carnivore. It <u>only</u> feeds on blood, flesh – hot, cold or rotten. As a carnivore 1080 is ineffective as a control as it's not meat but cereal based. However, a stoat could be killed if it consumes another dead animal which has previously consumed the 1080 resulting in that animal's demise. (bi-kill is the official term)

Understanding the life cycle of the stoat and why DOC has an uphill challenge to eradicate these animals by 2050.

- They are small, the body size is approximately the size of a young child's hand but as long as an older teenager's hand.
- High energy always moving around.
- When an adult female gives birth the placenta and the afterbirth including the nesting material attract the male usually the father but sometimes passing males. The result, the adult female is immediately impregnated despite having just given birth within 1-2days. But the female newborn kits are also impregnated. These kits are smaller than a human adult female's 'pinky'.
- The food source or mast determines the number of kits produced.
- The impregnated kit carries the sperm in a bag for approximately 1 year to 18 months before they too produce offspring.



- This process continues for every female stoat. Birth - impregnation - birth. Thus, influencing the population numbers and the continuation of their reputation as a dangerous predator for our Kiwi, kakapo chicks and skinks. A female stoat of any age is never on oestrus (heat), in the wild. Why, because she is always pregnant from birth. Although the female has potentially 2-3 eggs in her uterine wall ready for fertilisation the food supply determines the number of kits she actually produces.

Both male and female stoats are opportunistic in their feeding habits anything dead, fresh or rotten. They have been known to climb trees to a nest, kill the chicks by biting through the chest wall, leave that nest and return later to finish eating the bodies of these chicks approximately for up to a week later. The feeding range is approximately 1 1/4 kms. If eggs are in the nest they are broken in the hope of finding an embryo.



Stoats have no natural predators in New Zealand.
